Key issue

In many Member States there is still a discrepancy between policy-makers' acceptance of lifelong learning on the one hand, and lack of workable policies and strategies, on the other.

through:


- Developing and expanding the RVA Observatory and International Inventory on NQFs;

- Technical assistance and capacity-building to key stakeholders and practitioners in the field of RVA.




Make contribution to UNESCO's third landmark report on lifelong learning
